Plea For Help or Scam Outside St Torney's?

Rector Unaware of Begging in Porch

SUPERSTITION.—On Sunday last, as the Parishioners of North-hill were leaving the neat and recently-restored parish church, a scene of the grossest superstition met their view in the church porch. A young man, who had just been in a fit, was collecting one penny each from 30 unmarried women, for the purpose of purchasing a silver ring, to wear on his finger as a sure preventive against all future attacks from fits. This is the second occurrence of the kind within the last few months, a young woman having collected from 30 young men for the same purpose a month or so since. This conduct was unknown to the rector, or it would, doubtless, have been forbidden.

HARVEST THANKSGIVING.—Monday last was set apart as a day of thanksgiving at North-hill for the late harvest. Service was held in the Church, morning and afternoon, when collections were made for the Cornwall House of Mercy, Lostwithiel, and the Rowe Dispensary, at Launceston. In the evening, the children of the Church Sunday school were regaled with tea and cake at the rectory. The ringers rang several merry peals during the afternoon. The choir, on the occasion, were treated in such a manner as to show how their past services were appreciated.
